2023 August 20th to 25th

Report to the Synod of Central, Northern Ontario and Bermuda 2023 September 25

At Presbyterian Music Camp, music is central to our celebration and praise of God. We welcome all families and individuals who come together to experience inclusive Christian community in a natural outdoor setting.

Presbyterian Music Camp (PMC) 2023 - Summary:

PMC found a new home in 2023, Camp Kintail, near Goderich. Interest in PMC was very strong this year; camp was fully subscribed within a few weeks of the opening of registration. We had 156 registered campers, 116 adults, 12 teens, 18 children (5 -12) and 7 children under 5. The Deans for our week of camp were the Reverend Hugh Donnelly and David Linderman, both long-time campers and active leaders in Presbyterian congregations. Our Deans inspired our camp with the theme "Jesus, the great storyteller". The theme was explored in morning and evening worship services led by the deans and by camper families. Blessed with many volunteer workshop leaders, PMC 2023 offered a broad spectrum of activities including prayer group, bible study, choral and instrumental music, arts and crafts, drama and nature exploration. Recognizing a need within our community, the Caring Community Initiative subcommittee of the PMC board organized mental health workshops at the 2023 camp, thanks to the generous support of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. The grant is supported in part by a bequest to The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

PMC Theme in 2023. "Jesus, the great storyteller"

Morning and evening programs at PMC start with a short worship service. David Linderman opened services with music and short inspiring readings and quotations. Hugh Donnelly introduced the theme of the day and shared a meditation on the theme. Two of the evening services were led by camper families, focusing on the theme of the day.

Themes of the Day

Monday - Stories of Identity: Who are we as the people of God? Luke 8:42-48. (the woman who touched the hem of Jesus' garment)

Tuesday - Stories of Comfort: Where do we find peace? John 20:19-22 (resurrection appearance to the disciples)

Wednesday - Stories of Challenge: Where do we find growth? Matthew 5:13-16 (salt of the earth)

Thursday - Stories of Inclusion: Who's in God's community? Matthew 14:13-21 (feeding of 5000)

Friday - Stories of Hope: What keeps us going? Luke 24:13-35 (Emmaus)

PMC 2023 Camp Program

Camp Kintail was already booked for the week-end that would have been the final week-end of PMC, so this year camp finished on Friday, shortening our typical program. Workshops ran from Monday to Thursday with the final concert on Friday morning. Likewise, fewer evening programs were held, focusing on those most beloved by the community: campfire night, live-band karaoke / coffee house, variety (skit) night, and the closing Agape worship service.

Camp Kintail is a beautiful facility. The Kintail camp leadership and staff were wonderfully helpful and accommodating in supporting us as we adjusted our program to the new site and to the larger than usual number of campers.

The daily workshop program is presented in Exhibit 1. The schedule was designed to provide activities for each demographic in each of the 5 workshop periods. It has been customary for large group activities, like Camp Choir and Concert Band to be held in the morning, providing an opportunity for community building with child care options for parents. The afternoon workshops are generally smaller but more numerous, appealing to diverse interests.

As part of a special initiative of the board in 2022/2023, PMC offered Mental Health workshops led by Tom Roes, Registered Social Worker and Family Therapist. Two workshops were held each day to increase the opportunities for campers to attend. Approximately 30 campers attended one or both sessions. The conversations were free-flowing, discussing topics suggested by participants, expertly facilitated by Tom Roes. On Thursday, Tom met with individuals for 15 minute, private sessions and was also available through the week for one on one conversations. Feedback from campers was overwhelmingly positive.

Results from Camper Survey

Campers were asked to complete on-line or hardcopy surveys at the end of camp. We were very pleased to get 89 responses from a total camp population of 156, 25 of which were children 12 and under. The survey results will be considered in planning the 2024 camp. Key insights from the survey were:

- Campers were very happy with the Kintail site. The accommodations were comfortable and clean. The cabins would benefit from more shelving/storage space.
- The food at Camp Kintail was great. There were suggestions for more vegetarian protein sources and raw vegetables.
- The program was very much appreciated. There were requests for more variety for young children and non-musicians. Some workshop / event locations felt cramped.
- Campers look forward to a longer camp.

PMC Administrative Accomplishments in 2022 / 2023

The two main administrative initiatives of the PMC board last year were the camp site search and the Caring Community Initiative (mentioned above).

Caring Community Initiative

Through the course of the 2022 Music Camp, the PMC board recognized that many in our community were experiencing mental health challenges, exacerbated by the isolation of the pandemic. The PMC board struck a subcommittee, the Caring Community Initiative (CCI), to review our 2022 camp experience and to propose recommendations. The subcommittee's recommendations addressed camp procedures and training, and proposed that we offer a mental health workshop at the 2023 camp. The workshop was intended as a safe and supportive environment to better understand mental health issues. The cost of the training and mental health workshop recommendations were generously supported through a Presbyterian Church in Canada Special Projects Grant, which in turn was made possible by a bequest to the church. The subcommittee has prepared a full report that will be issued to the PCC.

Site Search

The PMC board was notified at the end of October, 2022, that Camp Tamarack had contracted with another, larger group and would not be offering a week to PMC. A subcommittee of the board reviewed a list of Ontario Camp Association registered camps that rent their facilities to the public. Through internet research and phone interviews, the subcommittee narrowed the list down to two viable candidate sites, which were visited in December. Camp Kintail, a Presbyterian camp near Goderich Ontario was selected. Due to previous commitments, Camp Kintail could not offer us a full week of camp until 2025, but could accommodate shorter (Sunday to Friday) camps in 2023 and 2024. Camp Kintail is a fantastic facility that can accommodate all PMC activities and has more to offer. While many campers were upset by the news that PMC would not be returning to Camp Tamarack, our experience at Camp Kintail was excellent and feedback from campers about the site is very positive. For over 25 years PMC has been part of the Synod of Central, Northern Ontario and Bermuda (CNOB). Relocation to Camp Kintail places PMC's physical location in the Synod of Southwestern Ontario. Conversations have already begun and will continue with the Synod Executive CNOB about the implications of this change of physical location. PMC's relation with the Presbyterian Church in Canada is very important to us and we are looking to continue and build that relationship.

Current PMC Financial Summary

The Board follows the principles listed below in the management of PMC finances:

- We will be good stewards of PMC community money;
- Our goal is to be revenue neutral;
- We prioritize making camp affordable for families and support campers that need financial help;
- All board and staff positions are unpaid, direct expenses related to camp activities are reimbursed at cost.

Even before the move from Camp Tamarack, the Board recognized that inflation of food and other costs over the last few years would necessarily increase camp rental and therefore PMC registration fees. The fees at Camp Kintail were higher, and structured differently. To encourage campers to make the move to camp Kintail and to ensure that registration fees for families would be affordable, the Board agreed to implement only a modest 5% increase in the adult camper fee and to subsidize the youth rate by \$200/camper from our surplus. (It must be acknowledged that, because our camp was two days shorter, our camper fees increased more than 5% implicitly.) We budgeted \$7,000 from our savings to cover a potential overrun. Thankfully, due to high registration numbers and generous donations to the Alison Stewart-Patterson fund that supports campers in financial need, the deficit for PMC 2023 was limited to \$3223.97. Our financial position is still preliminary; the final numbers rely on the HST rebate that we will receive at the end of the year and the gains or losses in

our Consolidated Portfolio investments. A financial summary is presented in the table below. A detailed accounting of our financial position (as of September 15th) is presented in Exhibit 2.
